INFORMATION FOR HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONALS

- NOACs increase the risk of bleeding and should be stopped if bleeding occurs.
- Aim to stop NOACs before surgical and invasive procedures – liaise with prescriber.
- Standard clotting tests do not accurately reflect the level of anticoagulation.
- Antidotes have been developed and may be available. Contact haematology to discuss if bleeding is severe.

Recommended follow-up

Blood sampling:

- Routine monitoring of anticoagulation level is not required.
- Yearly (at least) Hb, renal and liver function.
- If CrCl 30-60ml/min, >75y, or fragile: 6 monthly renal function.
- If CrCl 15-30ml/min: 3 monthly renal function. Perform additional tests if intercurrent condition that may have impact.

Check for adherence and side effects at each visit

INFORMATION FOR PATIENTS

- You have been prescribed a Non-Vitamin K Anticoagulant (NOAC) to prevent blood clots.
- Your NOAC must be taken exactly as prescribed. No drug means no protection!
- You must not stop taking your NOAC without talking to your doctor as you are at risk of suffering from a stroke or blood clot.
- All anticoagulants increase the risk of bleeding and you should report any bleeding symptoms to your doctor.
- Inform your pharmacist, dentist, surgeon or doctor before any procedures or new drug prescription.
- Do not take over the counter medicine without checking with health professionals.

If you miss a dose take it as soon as you remember and check your medicine information leaflet for instructions

EMERGENCY INFORMATION

Signs and symptoms of bleeding include:

- Tar-coloured stools, blood in urine, nose-bleed, bleeding of gums or from cuts that take a long time to stop.
- Bruising or bleeding under the skin with swelling or discomfort.
- Headache, dizziness, tiredness, paleness or weakness.
- Coughing up blood or vomiting blood or material that looks like coffee grounds.
- Loss of consciousness or drowsiness.

What should I do next?

- In the event of a bleeding event which does not stop on its own **immediately seek medical attention** and do not take any more doses until this has been reviewed.
